UCLA is committed to being a transfer-friendly institution. Strong academic preparation and performance make you a more competitive candidate during the admission review process. The average GPA of admitted transfer students is above 3.5, and admitted students have completed most or all major preparatory courses. We give the highest priority to applicants from California community colleges. UCLA admits students for fall quarter only.

WE PRACTICE A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW THAT INCLUDES CONSIDERATION OF ACADEMIC AND PERSONAL CRITERIA

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

- Junior-level standing (60 semester/90 quarter UC transferable units completed) by the end of the spring term before you transfer
- UC transferable GPA of 3.2 or higher
- ✓ Completion of major preparation requirements by the end of spring prior to transfer; these courses must be taken for a letter grade

Completion of the following by the end of spring prior to transfer:

- ▼ Two (2) transferable courses in English composition/critical thinking and writing
- ✓ One (1) transferable math course
- Four (4) transferable college courses in at least two of the following subject areas: arts and humanities, social and behavioral sciences, physical and biological sciences

PERSONAL FACTORS

Examples include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Employment while attending school
- Involvement in campus organizations and community service
- Family responsibilities
- Significant improvement in academics over time
- Military service
- Other opportunities or challenges that may have shaped your educational experiences

UC APPLICATION TIPS

- ▶ Report all institutions attended and courses on the UC application exactly as they appear on your transcript(s); including nontransferable courses, withdrawals, repeated courses, academic renewal, college courses taken while in high school, etc.
- ▶ Report your high school's language of instruction, if other than English.
- ▶ Explain any gaps in education.

- ▶ Submit a Transfer Academic Update (TAU) to report your final fall grades and planned winter/spring schedule. All applicants must submit a TAU by the January 31st priority deadline.
- ▶ Withdrawals, incomplete grades and academic renewals are not necessarily viewed negatively. Provide an explanation in the academic or additional comments section.



PERSONAL INSIGHT QUESTIONS

The **UC Application** asks all transfer applicants to answer one required question, and three out of seven additional questions. The Personal Insight Questions offer us an opportunity to learn more about you and to understand the experiences, accomplishments, and points of view you would bring to UCLA's undergraduate student community.

- Each response is limited to a maximum of 350 words.
- Respond to the three questions that are **most** relevant to your experience and that best reflect your individual circumstance.
- All questions are given equal consideration in the application review process. There is no advantage or disadvantage to choosing certain questions over others.

REQUIRED TRANSFER APPLICANT QUESTION

Please describe how you have prepared for your intended major, including your readiness to succeed in your upper-division courses once you enroll at the university.

ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS

- 1. Describe an example of your leadership experience in which you have positively influenced others, helped resolve disputes, or contributed to group efforts over time.
- 2. Every person has a creative side, and it can be expressed in many ways: problem solving, original and innovative thinking, and artistically, to name a few. Describe how you express your creative
- 3. What would you say is your greatest talent or skill? How have vou developed and demonstrated that talent over time?

- 4. Describe how you have taken advantage of a significant educational opportunity or worked to overcome an educational barrier you have faced.
- 5. Describe the most significant challenge you have faced and the steps you have taken to overcome this challenge. How has this challenge affected your academic achievement?
- 6. What have you done to make your school or your community a better place?
- 7. Beyond what has already been shared in your application, what do you believe makes you stand out as a strong candidate for admissions to the University of California?

Special Instructions for Veterans

UCLA is interested in learning about your military service and how it may have shaped your educational path. You may choose to discuss your military experience in your personal insight question responses or any other relevant section.

tips for becoming a strong applicant



- Complete the math and **at least one** of the English composition courses with letter grades by the **end of fall term prior** to transfer.
- ✓ Complete major prerequisites as early as possible. It is strongly recommended you complete major preparation for highly selective majors such as Business Economics,
 Communication, Economics and Psychology by the fall term prior to transferring.
- Meet with a community college counselor to check for transferable coursework, limitations, duplicate courses and other restrictions to avoid being deficient in units and/or requirements.*
- ✓ Complete the correct course sequence for certain subjects, depending on your major. For example, if your major requires calculus, be sure you are taking the correct sequence as listed on the major agreement.*
- Review your AP or IB credits to determine if they will transfer and if they will satisfy certain UC 7-course pattern and/or UCLA major preparation requirements.

- Prioritize completing eligibility and major preparation requirements before IGETC/CalGETC. They are not required for admission to any major with the exception of majors in the School of Nursing and the School of Theater, Film and Television.
- You may satisfy major preparation for majors that require foreign language with any of the following:
 - College-level foreign language courses
 - AP/IB exams with an appropriate score
 - If you attended a high school where the language of instruction is a language other than English (typically high school outside the U.S.)

High school foreign language courses will NOT satisfy major preparation requirements for admission purposes.




